Description of Proposed Change	
There is a need to clarify that equivalent areas are allowable when grading pockets and pitch streaks in both Premium and Standard grades of Radius Edge Decking.	
Rationale	
Radius Edge Decking, while not an NGR-regulated product, utilizes NGR language/sizes to describe the allowable pocket ("medium") and allowable pitch streak sizes (1/6 nominal width x 1/3 length) in both Premium and Standard grades. The NGR allows equivalent areas when grading these defects, but this is not made clear in the language of section 420.	
Proposal	
Add the phrase, "with equivalent areas being permissible" at the end of each defect description.

Example of proposed modified text (Section 422, Premium R.E.D):	
Pitch Pockets and Bark Pockets – medium (1/16" in width and 12" in length, or 1/8" in width and 8" in length, or 3/8" in width and 4" in	

length), with equivalent areas being permissible

Pitch Streaks – 1/6 nominal width by 1/3 length, with equivalent areas being permissible

## NGR Pocket and Pitch Streak definitions:

730 PITCH STREAK - Is a well-defined accumulation of pitch in the wood cells in a streak. Pitch streaks are described as follows, with equivalent areas being permissible: (a) Very small pitch streak 3/8" in width and 15" in length. (b) Small pitch streak 1/12 the width and 1/6 the length of the piece. (c) Medium pitch streak 1/6 the width and 1/3 the length of the piece. (d) A large pitch streak is not over 1/4 the width by 1/2 the length of the surface. (e) A very large pitch streak is over 1/4 the width by 1/2 the length of the surface. (f) A pitch seam is a shake or check which contains pitch.

**734 POCKET** - A well-defined opening between the rings of annual growth which develops during the growth of the tree. It usually contains pitch or bark.

Pockets are described as follows with equivalent areas being permissible: (a) Very small pocket - 1/16" in width and 3" in length, or 1/8" in width and 2" in length. (b) Small pocket - 1/16" in width and 6" in length, or 1/8" in width and 4" in length, or 1/4" in width and 2" in length. (c) Medium pocket - 1/16" in width and 12" in length, or 1/8" in width and 8" in length, or 3/8" in width and 4" in length. (d) A large pocket is not over 4 square inches in area. (e) A very large pocket is over 4 square inches in area. (e) A very large pocket has an opening on one surface only. (g) A through or open pocket has an opening on opposite surfaces, and the through opening is considered the same as a through hole of equal size.
